- ★ Priestley's name will appear somewhere in the question (bullet points/question itself) to remind you that Priestley has used language/form/structure to create effects so you must explore this in your answer
- ★ Context: again, this shouldn't dominate your answer as it is worth only 6 marks. Context can include: context in which the text was written. context within which the text is set. the literary genre as a whole, contexts which texts are engaged with by different audiences (how would a post-holocaust audience view IC?)
